

150th Anniversary of the Birth of JM Barrie

Although he and his wife had no children of their own, celebrated author J M Barrie, most famously known for his creation of Peter Pan, was a supporter of the work of **Great Ormond Street Hospital for children** in London for several years.

In 1929, GOSH asked Barrie if he would join a committee to assist in buying some land for a new wing for the hospital. Although Barrie declined, he indicated his desire to help the hospital, saying he "hoped to find another way". Two months later, the hospital was astonished to learn that Barrie had most generously given all the rights to Peter Pan over to GOSH.

The only official sequel to Barrie's book Peter Pan and Wendy was sanctioned by GOSH and, in 2006, Peter Pan in Scarlet by Geraldine McCaughrean was published. Two years later the book was published as a fully illustrated edition abridged for younger children; our stamps show selected images taken from the book which features the stunning artwork of David Wyatt.

Set in the 1920s, Peter Pan in Scarlet sees the return of Wendy and the Lost Boys, as Peter Pan needs his friends' help. But everything has changed in Neverland and they encounter pirates, witches and fairies, and dangers beyond their imaginations.

Barrie had previously known a little girl, Margaret Henley, who died at the age of six. She called him 'my friendy', which she lisped as 'fwendy' or 'wendy'; Barrie immortalised her in Peter Pan by calling his heroine Wendy

* Alderney * ** Christmas Carols 2010















We always delight in producing our Christmas stamp issues, with so many fabulous themes linked to the festive season we have plenty of creative inspiration.

This year for the first time ever we have produced a Christmas stamp issue for Alderney along with those for Guernsey and have had the tricky task of selecting a topic which could span both Island issues but which provided enough scope to produce two individual and unique stamp sets.

The subject 'Christmas Carols' gave us plenty to work with; a tradition which for many symbolises the joy and excitement of Christmas and one which has been celebrated throughout the ages. It also gave us the opportunity to look at a range of carols, investigate their origins and design fabulously innovative stamps to illustrate each one. With the clever and creative use of modern typography we've brought each of our selected carols graphically to life on our stamps.

* Guernsey * * * Christmas Carols 2010









Carols were first sung in Europe thousands of years ago, but these were not in fact Christmas carols as we know them now, but pagan songs, sung at the Winter Solstice celebrations. The Winter Solstice is the shortest day of the year and usually occurs around the 22nd December.

Early Christians adopted the pagan solstice celebrations, replacing the pagan songs with Christian ones which celebrated Christmas.

Initially not many people enjoyed carols as they were all written and sung in Latin, a language that the lay people couldn't understand and then by the time of the Middle Ages (the 1200s), most people had lost interest in celebrating Christmas altogether.

This all changed around 1223 when St. Francis of Assisi began to stage Nativity Plays in Italy. The cast of these plays sang songs or 'canticles' as a method of story telling. Sometimes, the choruses of these new carols were in Latin; but normally they were all in a language that the people watching the play could understand and join in! The new style carols spread to France, Spain, Germany and other European countries.

However when Oliver Cromwell and the Puritans came to power in England in 1647, celebrations of Christmas and the singing of carols was stopped, but the tradition of carols survived as many people still enjoyed singing them in secret.

'Carol singing' as we think of it today became popular in the Victorian era, but prior to this there were official carol singers called 'Waits'. These were bands of people led by important local leaders such as council leaders who had the power in the towns and villages to take money from the public. They were called 'Waits' as they only sang on Christmas Eve, which was also known as 'watchnight' or 'waitnight' in memory of the shepherds who were watching their sheep when the angels appeared to them announcing Christ's birth.

Also around this time orchestras and choirs were being set up in the cities of England and people wanted Christmas songs to sing, so carols once again became popular and many new carols were written.

Today along with Santa Claus, decorating our homes and kissing under the mistletoe singing Christmas carols is very much a part of our festive celebrations.

Did you know?

- 1. In 1843 English illustrator John Calcott Horsley created the first modern Christmas card. It was commissioned by Sir Henry Cole the pioneer of the penny post and founder of the Victoria & Albert Museum. The card depicted a family celebration and its caption read. "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You."
- 2. The custom of sending Christmas cards started in Britain in 1840 when the first 'Penny Post' public postal deliveries began, although Europeans had distributed wood prints of religious themes for Christmas during the Middle Ages.
- 3. Postmen in Victorian times were often called 'Robins' as their uniform was red.
- 4. In the nineteenth century the British Post Office used to deliver cards on Christmas morning.
- 5. Every UK adult now sends on average 55 Christmas cards each year.
